

Home Group Discussion Guide for Spiritual Disciplines: Disciple-making

The following questions are designed to help groups explore the message above by challenging participants to consider how God is wanting them to apply it to their lives.

*The questions are a **guide** to help lead discussion.*

Please don't feel that all questions need to be asked, instead respond to the needs of your group.

If you have new people in your group, take the opportunity to introduce each other and clarify any expectations that are present in your group (such as confidentiality).

GETTING STARTED

1. Who has been a key person in your discipling journey? Why are they a key person for you?
2. What was the main challenge or idea that stood out to you from the message on Sunday?

REFLECTING ON THE MESSAGE

Key Scriptures: *Matt 28:16-20; Acts 16:6-15; Luke 10:1-16*

1. Tim made a comment based on the Great Commission (Matt 28:16-20) that disciple-making is for both Christians and Non-Christians.
 - a. Does this change the way you view discipleship? If so, how?

(Read Acts 16:6-10)

2. Paul and his companions had some very obvious signs showing them where God is at work.
 - a. What are some of the ways that you have noticed / become aware of God being at work in the people around you?
 - b. When you see these things happening, how do you respond?
3. In Luke 10:1-16 Jesus sends the 72 out and encourages them to find **People of Peace** as they minister, a sign that God is already at work in their hearts. Tim shared 3 qualities that make someone a person of peace; i.e. they **like** you, they **listen** to you and they **serve** you.
 - a. Can you identify any people of peace in your life currently?
4. The 4 types of relational pathways that Tim noted were casual, meaningful, spiritual and discovery. These can be seen in Acts 16:13-15.
 - a. Can you identify people in your life that you have these types of conversations with?
 - b. What would it look like for you to intentionally cultivate some of these conversations?

RESPONDING TO THE MESSAGE

1. Is there someone in your life that God is currently at work in?
2. What would it look like for you to join in with what God is doing and to disciple that person to faith?
